ICE BREAKER: Describe a good habit you keep regularly.

LARGE GROUP QUESTIONS:

The **good news** is Zechariah and Elizabeth were a godly couple. They "were **upright** in the sight of God, observing all the Lord's commandments and regulations **blamelessly**." The **sad news** is they were a **disgrace** in their community. Why? Because "they had no children, because Elizabeth was barren; and they were both well along in years."

Despite **faithful obedience** to the Lord, Zechariah and Elizabeth **suffered** disgrace and ridicule from fellow Jews. Elizabeth herself described her childlessness as "**my disgrace** among the people" (25).

1. Describe a time you were obedient to do the right thing in God's eyes yet suffered disgrace or hardship.

(Read verses 6-7) Jews considered **childlessness** a **curse** from God, a **withholding** of **His blessing**. The Rabbis said that seven people were **excommunicated** from God and the list began with, "A Jew who has no wife, or a Jew who has a wife and who has no child." Childlessness was a valid ground for **divorce**.

The Bible repeatedly emphasizes that God delights to **reward obedience.** Elizabeth was obedient and faithful, yet she was **barren**. She could easily name many other Jewish women who were not faithful, yet they were blessed with children.

2. How do you handle seeing God withhold blessings from the faithful, yet give them to the unfaithful?

(Read verses 11-15) For years, Zechariah and Elizabeth hoped for a **miracle**, **an answer to their prayers**. They hoped for the **impossible** to be made **possible**—that **old** and **barren** Elizabeth would bear a child. Finally, God answered in a spectacular way. An angel named Gabriel visited Zechariah proclaiming, "Zechariah, your **prayer** has been heard! Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son."

3. What have you seen moves the hand of God to make the impossible possible in our lives?

(Read verses 18-20) When a messenger from God, an angel no doubt, proclaimed the coming birth of his new son John, Zechariah was **not** filled with **faith**, but with **doubt**. Immediately, Zechariah recounted Elizabeth's and his own **physical limitations**, "How can I be sure of this? I am an **old** man and my wife is **well along** in **years**."

4. Why do people still doubt God even after witnessing a miracle or answered prayer?
